Poverty rears its ugly head throughout our world. We are continually bombarded each day in the media with the disheartening facts that the gap between the fortunate and the less fortunate continues to increase. Despite Texas' improving economy, child poverty continues to increase which places Texas among the nine worst states for children living in poverty. Although poverty is not destiny, it can make it difficult for a child to have a strong beginning in life.

Knowledge and education can be important allies against poverty. As a teacher of children who lived with meager essentials, I am very well aware of and adamant about the dire importance of ensuring that all students participate in curriculum and instruction that is based upon teaching for meaning. This means making concerted efforts to ensure that students affected by poverty are represented when providing rigorous academic opportunities for all students. Education will be their success.

Finally, involving parents, recruiting community organizations, involving educational organizations such as Delta Kappa Gamma, and enlisting the help of religious institutions can aid in closing the achievement gap that in many cases may be the result of living in poverty. These groups working in concert with educational institutions is paramount if children living in poverty are to experience brighter lives.

Let us not forget that these children with whom our world is blessed, the future of our nations, are our responsibilities: to have and to hold, to educate to the fullest of their potentials, to ensure that those who presently live in poverty will in the future live a life full of hope, success, blessings, and peace.
